In his foreword to the first edition, Heinz Stammberger commended the Editors, David Kennedy and Peter Hwang, for bringing together many of the leading experts in rhinology to create a comprehensive, contemporary, and cohesive text that captured the rapid advances across the breadth of rhinology. To assist them, they have brought together nearly 170 experts from around the globe and rejuvenated the book with both new and updated chapters and an extended library of fully narrated videos. The quality of the text, illustrations, and accompanying videos is a testament to their passion and dedication not only to this book, but also to our specialty as a whole. I congratulate them on what remains a benchmark for years to come.
